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## MRSA RACE TO BALTIMORE- 15<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL SAIL FOR SIGHT

Retinal degenerative diseases such as retinitis pigmentosa and macular degeneration affect over 6 million men, women, and children across the country. We Magothy River sailors, along with many other Bay sailors, have a unique opportunity to help fight these diseases, while doing something we love at the 15<sup>th</sup> annual Sail for Sight on Saturday, July 12<sup>th</sup>. The Sail for Sight is a benefit race jointly sponsored by the MRSA and the BCYA that raises money for the Foundation Fighting Blindness (<http://www.blindness.org>).

The event is a point-to-point race conveniently starting just outside the mouth of the Magothy near Baltimore Light and finishing in the Patapsco River near Baltimore's Inner Harbor. This is one of the northern Bay's premier racing events, with large competitive fleets followed by an excellent party complete with food, drink, and a band at the Downtown Marine Center in Baltimore. Boats raising a minimum of \$10 per foot of boat length to benefit the Foundation Fighting Blindness will receive a tee shirt for each crew member, free dockage at the Baltimore Marine Center at Lighthouse Point, and free entry to the party with no additional charges for food and drink. Having participated many times in this event, I can personally vouch that this event, both on and off the water is not to be missed!

I encourage all MRSA members to participate directly by racing. If you can't race, make a contribution to the Foundation Fighting Blindness through a fellow Magothy River sailor who is racing. It's a great event for a great cause and an opportunity for the MRSA to make a difference beyond the River, beyond the Bay, and beyond the sport. On Saturday we leave Harris Creek and proceed to "Green 1" marking the entrance to Broad Creek, then heading north up Broad Creek to "Red 4" before turning east. 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## **SEA FAN LOG - MARCH 2003**

I've been writing a monthly log for almost three years now, and it seems to be getting a bit repetitive. We still do the same things, with the same enjoyment, living this relaxed cruising life. So from now on, I'll only write about special events, activities, and such. For instance. MANTA RAY!! One day in March in Maho Bay, I noticed a very large, slowly moving dark spot in the water. I called Steve and, both agreeing it was much too big to be a turtle, I grabbed a mask and the look bucket while Steve started the dinghy, and we went to see what it was. A MANTA RAY!! I jumped in immediately, with the largest creature I've even gone swimming with. It was at least as wide as I am tall, and probably closer to six feet from wing tip to wing tip. Dark, almost black on top with gray areas on the shoulders, and almost pure white under-

neath, it moved through the water with the slightest ripple of its wings. Its mouth wide open, a cavern for collecting the plankton it feeds on, it did slow loops under me. The ray seemed unconcerned about me snorkeling above him. But when I dove and touched its wing, it flinched. It didn't move away, and I don't know if it was just startled or didn't like the touch. It was very soft and smooth. We have seen the Manta several times since, snorkeling along with it as it moved among the moored boats. The park biologist says it is very rare to see a manta ray at all, especially to see one in the bay. This one, by all reports, has been visiting Maho Bay for about a month. We hope it's still here when Mara and Randall visit in April.

Another new observation later in the month in Salt Pond. While following a turtle as it grazed on the grass on the bottom, I watched it head for the reef along the shore. It cruised over the reef, then picked a tube sponge and calmly ate it in three bites. First time we've seen a turtle eat anything but grass. I've learned from David that the Green Sea Turtles eat only grass, but the Hawksbill turtles eat a more varied diet, so it was a Hawksbill I saw feasting on sponge. Sponges are supposed to taste awful, but I guess not to the turtle; they also eat jellyfish, which are not too appealing as a food, either. David also told me how to tell the difference between Greens and Hawksbills -


